Attendance

Attendance remains a high priority in school. Pupil attendance is monitored on a weekly basis and children who are persistently absent (less than 90% attendance) are monitored even more closely.

Please make sure if your child is too unwell to come to school, you inform school through Parentmail or leave a message on the school answerphone. If we do not know why your child is absent it will be marked as an unauthorised absence.

We also have a lot of children who are regularly late and not arriving until 9.30am or later. Registers close at 9.15am and if your child arrives later than that they have to be marked as unauthorised for the whole morning.

I would also like to remind parents that there are very few exceptional circumstances where I am allowed to authorise a term time holiday. Please be aware, especially as we are coming into the warmer summer weather, if you book a term time holiday you will be at risk a fixed penalty notice being issued.



DID YOU KNOW? A two week holiday in term time means that the highest attendance you can achieve is 94.7%


Online Concerns

We have a lot of children who use iPads and phones to keep in touch outside of school using messaging sites. We are seeing an increasing number of problems arise from these interactions. When children have arguments online, the language used can end up being quite aggressive and very inappropriate. It also results in children coming into school the following day feeling anxious and worried.



Can I ask parents to monitor your child's use of online activity carefully, particularly if they use messaging sites.

- How large are the chat groups they are in? Do they know all of these people?
- How appropriate is the language?
- Are the children arguing and being aggressive to a person in the chat?
- What images are being shared?
